## In the Press

In the news: <u>One in five</u> samples of retail dairy milk are testing positive for avian influenza viral fragments.

Why is this important? The infection of U.S. dairies with avian influenza appears to be much more widespread than initially thought, causing generally

mild illness in dairy cattle and leaving viral remnants in dairy milk products. While only one dairy worker so far has been confirmed as infected, the virus could be transmitted to more humans with potentially deadly consequences, sparking fears of another pandemic.

**The facts?** As Associate Director of Policy & Research <u>Ann Linder</u> detailed in the ALPP report <u>Animal</u> <u>Markets and Zoonotic Disease in the United States</u>, industrial animal agriculture creates and exacerbates the risk of pandemics. The report notes that "influenzas are perceived by experts to be the most dangerous because of their pandemic potential, driven by their ability to reassort, mutate, and spread through droplets in the air." The World Health Organization's Chief Scientist, Dr. Jeremy Farrar, <u>recently called</u> the widespread avian influenza outbreak, which he says primarily started in poultry and duck flocks several years ago, a "global zoonotic – animal – pandemic."

**Bottom line:** Government officials are <u>expanding</u> dairy herd testing and still need to investigate whether pasteurization fully inactivates bird flu in dairy milk. Over the long term, as Ann Linder stated in an <u>interview</u> in the Harvard Gazette last year, "[w]e need a unifying, comprehensive scheme" to address regulatory and communication gaps in order to proactively prevent and respond to disease outbreaks like this one.

Hay que regular la Inteligencia Artificial para que no sea discriminatoria con los animales (translation: Artificial Intelligence must be regulated so that it does not discriminate against animals), *Animalados*, April 25, 2024.

Visiting Fellow <u>Silvina Pezzetta</u> was interviewed by Animalados and featured in a story published on their Spanishlanguage platform. The interview discusses the contradiction between Argentina's role as both the nation with the highest beef consumption per capita and as a nation with some of the most favorable judicial decisions for animals, recognizing some animals as bearers of rights. It also discusses the need to reduce speciest biases in the development of artificial intelligence and to consider negative impacts on animals in addition to those on human rights, vulnerable populations, and the environment when designing regulatory limitations on the novel technology.

Additionally, Silvina Pezzetta's scholarship will be published in a forthcoming issue of the Chilean legal journal *Ius et Praxis*. Her article, written in Spanish, is titled *Animal Welfare and Animal Rights. Argentinean legal regulation and Caselaw*.

Lunch with Philosopher Paula Casal Harvard Law School

The Brooks McCormick Animal Law & Policy Program will host a lunch event with philosopher <u>Paula Casal</u>, at which she will talk about nonhuman animal persons and their rights. Is a person a kind of animal? How have the features associated with personhood evolved in very different species? How do these features alter the moral rights an individual or group may have?



Paula Casal is an ICREA Professor at the Law Department of Universitat Pompeu Fabra (Barcelona). She was previously a Lecturer and a Reader in Moral and Political Philosophy at Reading University (2004-08), and a Lecturer at Keele University (1996-2004). She was also a Fellow in Ethics at Harvard University (1999-2000), Keele Junior Research Fellow, also at Harvard (2000-01), Hoover Fellow at Université Catholique de Louvain (2001-02), and Leverhulme Research Fellow at Oxford University (2002-04). Her work has appeared in journals such as *Ethics, Economics and Philosophy, Journal of Moral Philosophy, Journal of Political Philosophy, Political Studies*, and *Utilitas*. She is also President of the Great Ape Project-Spain and Co-Director of the UPF Centre for Animal Ethics.
